



stablished on 17th April 2020, the Confederation of Nepalese I ndustries (CNI), is an umbrella organization of the manufacturing and service sector of Nepal. CNI is a professionally led apex body of the country's industrial and corporate sector operating with a theme of "Talking Business, Talking Change". A non-government, not-for-profit organization, CNI is the voice of Nepal's business and industry. From influencing policy to engaging with policymakers and civil society, CNI articulates the views and concerns of industries of Nepal. CNI provides a platform for networking and consensus building within and across sectors and serves its members from the Nepalese private and public corporate sectors. CNI is actively raising issues related to investment and industrial development as well as export promotion of Nepal and simultaneously providing sector related legal and policy suggestion to government institutions.

The establishment of CNI was based on the widespread belief that the industrial society of Nepal urgently needed an effective representative body that would serve as a true platform to concentrate on many issues plaguing the Nepalese industries. There was a common understanding of the establishment of a modern professional body with well-trained and experienced professional staff that would be fully supported by the latest technological advancements. Keeping this thing in mind, CNI is committed to ensure meaningful policy inputs to the government, to create an industrial environment conducive to both the domestic as well as foreign investment and proper representation of the manufacturing and service industries of Nepal.

CNI is working and associated with several business organizations of developing as well as developed countries in Asia, Africa, Europe and America as globalization has stepped everywhere and a harbinger of change has taken place in the Nepalese economy due to the global economy. With this regard, CNI has strong associations with the chambers and business organizations in India, China, Sri Lanka, Bangladesh, Pakistan, Hong Kong, Singapore, Czech Republic, Turkey, Myanmar and also works in close cooperation with international networks.

Based on a well-established organizational structure, CNI is a corporate-led and professionally managed non-governmental, non-political and not for profit Organization. Therefore, a team of highly competent professionals of the concerned fields to translate its vision and national interest to ground reality. CNI is a powerful and effective advocate for economic growth and policy change to promote industrial climate as well as investment. It has become a vital source of experts' advice and information to boost up investors' confidence in employment generation. CNI is envisioned to ensure that the government as well as the wider community including business, donors and civil society understand the needs of the growth of the Nepalese I ndustry and the contributions CNI makes to the well-being of the general public.

CNI promotes business and industry in Nepal while protecting the rights and interests of business and industrial communities. Through its expertise, CNI provides information, advisory, consultative, promotional and representative services to business organizations as well as the Central and Provencial government. According to the underlined philosophy and given assumption, CNI has been providing a forum for the generation of ideas, for exchange of views and the enlargement of useful business networking based on the following principles:

- Functioning solely on defined objective and prudent policies with the democratic mechanism of preoperational representation guided by the CNI Constitution.
- Adopting a pro-active partnership approach internally with its constituents as well as with the government and other national and international organizations including development partners.

- Play an instrumental role to create a conducive environment for investment in the country's industrial sectors and provide necessary inputs as well as services for the establishment and development of supportive institutions.
- Provide crucial recommendations and facilitate different government bodies as well
 as agencies on issues related to industrial promotion, economic policy formulation and
 investment facilitation along with the improvements required on the same as per the
 requirement.
- Develop a team of professionals at CNI with competencies and commitment for promoting national economy as well as member's business interests and formulate necessary rules and regulations, within the framework of the CNI constitution, to regulate the activities of the Confederation.



- Be financially self-reliant by expanding the member base, industry association, CNI
 Proviences and contact offices throughout Nepal and introduce new services to member
 enterprises and to those who need CNI's assistance to expand their businesses with high
 professionalism.
- Build an affiliation, cooperation and mutual rapport with the international public as well
 as private institutions with an aim of promotion and development of bilateral, regional and
 international trade and investment and share experiences and views among international
 organizations.
- Work in the field of research and development both at the national and international level in
 the issues related to industrial development, factor productivity, technological advancement,
 product innovation, trade facilitation, industrial relation, taxation among many other possible
 areas of business and investment expansion within and outside the country.

CNI: OBJECTIVE AND GOALS

he principal objective of CNI is to encourage positive competition and competent management among the industries while promoting domestic and foreign investment and creating employment opportunities in the country's industrial and corporate sectors.

Apart from this, CNI has identified the following specific goals and working to achieve the same.

- To provide meaningful policy inputs to the government in the area of industrial development, investment and export promotion, trade facilitation, industrial relation, etc.

CNI has a hierarchical functional organizational structure. All the CNI activities and functions are carried out under a vertical line of command and through the respective bodies as follows:


General Body


Office Bearers



Likewise, the secretariat constitutes information collection and dissemination unit, forums, committees supported by competitive professionals and support staff.

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CNI: POLICIES

In Nepal economic reforms started in the mid-1980s and were intensified and augmented in the early 1990s immediately after the restoration of democracy in 1990. Since the early nineties, Nepal has implemented extensive legal and policy reforms to facilitate its integration with the global economy. Like many other developing countries, Nepal as a democratic republic has pursued an inward-looking and state-led development strategy through central, provincial and local level.

However, the impact of these reforms on trade, economic growth and Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) has so far been weak. Lack of co-ordination between central, provincial and local government, the political instability, lower literacy rate, under-utilization of the available resources, geographical difficulty, etc. are some of the reasons behind Nepal being unable to attract a large number of investors. Unlike other years, this year the Corona Virus Pandemic has largely hampered the domestic as well as foreign investment performance.

Despite all these, CNI believes that Nepal still can grip the opportunity to lift its economy through privileged access to a well-disposed neighboring country with large markets, young generation population, a flourishing local entrepreneurial culture in both small and large business and expanded Networking and Economic Diplomacy at national and international levels. With abundant natural resources, Nepal can reflect itself as a potential nation to attract ideal investment packages for both domestic and foreign investors. For this advanced reform in the existing policies as well as incentives and reforms for the industries of Nepal must be prioritized.

With this view, CNI aims to work with the Government and Development Partners for improving the investment climate, investment performance and industrial development. In order to achieve economic growth, CNI adheres to the following policies while performing its activities:

Foreign Direct Investment (FDI)

investment policies so that private

economic development. However, there is a tough competition to attract FDI in their respective countries. CNI, in association with the Government of Nepal, will make an effort to change the mindset of foreign investors from 'Why Nepal' to 'Why not Nepal'.

 Infrastructures are crucial for the investment promotion and industrial development of a country. To develop infrastructure at a faster pace, besides peace and security, CNI will help the Government of Nepal to bring favorable

infrastructure projects.

 Productivity, the most crucial variable for dynamic economic growth and employment creation, is low because the government is not oriented towards productivity enhancement —rather they are focused on cheap labor. CNI will function to enhance industrial relations; much more investment in human resources; paying living wages including Social Security Fund (SSF); introduction of modern technology, and a strategic vision, based on consensus and making

stringent labor laws, so as to increase the labor productivity

- As the leader of private sectors, CNI will focus to increase the productivity through skill development and technological adaptation programs for national economic growth and risk management in the unfolding era of uncertainty, crisis and conflict.
- The cost of transaction and cost of funds should be reduced as a matter of priority to uplift the competitiveness of the Nepalese economy and to ameliorate the investment climate. In this respect, CNI is very sincere and ready to work with the government as well as Nepal Rastra Bank (NRB), the central bank of Nepal in the issues of financial sector reform and capital market development, which in turn will be instrumental for enhancing financial deepening and reducing the cost of capital.
- There is a lack of proper
 communication with foreign investors.

- and telecommunications. Although, the State must provide such infrastructures to level playing field; CNI will take an initiative and contribute in this aspect through Public-Private Partnership (PPP) mechanism.
- It is being recognized that the private sectors (formal and informal) are the true engines of economic growth. But at present, the role of private sectors in the national economy, employment generation, policy-making as well as strategy formulation is not acknowledged despite the advent of the liberal democracy. In this respect, CNI will act as lobbyists or pressure groups to narrow down the gap and further broaden the contribution of private sectors by enhancing the professionalism as well as business integrity in line with the national interest.
- The principal objective of CNI is to encourage positive competition and competent management among

about the investment-related issues, rules, regulations, opportunities and procedures. This is why Nepal is not receiving an adequate amount of foreign investment which has created problems when the foreign investors want to repatriate the profit/dividend. Thus CNI, through the recently developed information portal 'Invest Nepal' along with its regional and global networking, will be actively disseminating the primary information to all the foreign investors on the aspect of FDI.

 Challenges from international competitiveness cannot be met without adequate infrastructures such as roads, warehouses, electricity, water, sanitation the industries, promoting domestic and foreign investment, and to create employment opportunities in the country's industrial and corporate sector. Thus, CNI will be working as a "Think Tank" institution for the management and development of the economic and industrial sectors of Nepal through the means of research and development (R&D).

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

CNI INTERNATIONAL PARTNERSHIP

In order to foster the relationship between Nepal and the rest of the world, and to facilitate economic growth of Nepal through improved investment climate, industrial development, CNI has been focusing to expand its global presence. As promoting professionalism and positive competition is one of the major working areas of CNI, it has signed Memorandum of Understanding (MoUs) with the public and private organizations of regional as well as global level. By doing that, CNI has envisaged that such collaboration will be a milestone for a strategic partnership between these organizations.

CNI believes that having bilateral agreements with regional and international associations will help it in achieving its goals of enhancing professionalism in management, advancement in technology and development of trade and industry in the country. Towards this end, CNI has some very important bilateral agreements with a number of important trade and industry organizations throughout the world which are listed here in chronological order:

Networking with Regional Chambers and Development Partners

A. Regional Chambers




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CNI FUNCTIONS

As an apex institution country's industrial and business sectors, CNI's outlook is to provide efficient, flexible and impartial services including administrative and support, secretarial and other professional assistance for the facilitation along with supervision, arbitration and conciliation proceedings.

The major functions of CNI include the following:

Help to Create an Investment Friendly Climate in Nepal

With the continued low levels of output/
income and a low savings rate, expanding
economic growth requires an expanded level
of investment – there is no other way to grow
the economy. This new investment cannot
take place from domestic sources because
Nepal does not possess the sizeable stock of
accumulated savings that would be needed.
Neither it is likely to come from foreign
remittances, which now play a significant
role in offsetting a gradually-increasing trade
deficit, but is habitually used for consumption
expenditure. Foreign Direct I nvestment (FDI)
thus assumes a level of importance that will

what is needed to achieve this objective. The policy documents thus must be focused to attract greater levels of both foreign and domestically-generated investment to take advantage of Nepal's abundant investment opportunities.

The investment policy is derived development and the objectives it sets for itself in putting in place a series of beliefs or aspirations that will be the defining cornerstone of future activity in the investment area. In this connection, one of the major functions of CNI is to work with the government to provide a clear and authoritative approach to development, to assure the private sector that its capital as well as the business will be supported by the legislative policies and acts.

of economic growth and development as projected by the government.

To be successful in attracting investment, Nepal must be competitive and be viewed as one of the countries with the most open, investor-friendly, and progressive business environments in the region. To this end, the government must be committed to change the mindset of all stakeholders to reflect for creating employment, raising national income, and generating wealth. In this context, CNI organized Pre-Infrastructure Summit/Workshop in all the seven provinces where the Chief Ministers, high ranking officials of provinces and investors were present. After that, CNI organized Nepal Infrastructure Summit 2019 (Third Series) at Hyatt Regency, Kathmandu on September 11 and 12, 2019 with a theme "Strong"

2. Enhance Private Sector Capacity and Capabilities

The role of the private sector for sustained economic development is always at the forefront. The present global economic experiences reaffirmed the notion that the invisible hand of the market would always contribute to accelerate the growth process in a sustained manner. Market-oriented development strategies encourage increasing private sector involvements in the development process, limiting the government's role as a facilitator & developer of the private sector through the investments on building physical infrastructure and human resources so as to create an

- To change the government's formal vision with recognized and honored importance as well as the contribution of the private sector in the national economy

- To make the private sectors able to compete in the regional as well as the international market in the era of globalization
- To encourage public confidence in the goods and services produced and offers by the country's private sector thereby promoting the export
- To facilitate and create sound industrial relations at the national and enterprise level and establish good relations with the trade unions to create a good working environment

environment conducive for private sector development.

In such a situation, the Confederation of Nepalese Industries (CNI), as a private sector organization and one of the associates of the country's prosperity, indeed, has been focusing on the capacity development of the private sector, the engine of the growth. The motives behind this function are as follows:

 To promote and intensify the capacity of the country's private sector as the government has been adopting the free market economy policy since almost the past two decades in the country.

3. Become the Sounding Voice of the Industries

As one of the main objectives of establishing CNI was to boost up the country's industrial sectors through the increased confidence of businesses operating in Nepal and attracting foreign direct investment (FDI) to accelerate economic growth, CNI has actively been working as the sounding voice of industries. To increase the level of business confidence, the domestic environment should be conducive to the investors at the national and international levels. To establish and

maintain such an environment in Nepal CNI has continuously been advocating and lobbying for the betterment of the country's industrial community and for maximized social welfare of general people.

CNI has highlighted several important points about and different facets of the business climate as well as industrial promotion. There is a cross-regional and cross-sectoral consensus among business persons and industrialists all over Nepal on the fact that government regulation and policy have posed the biggest hindrance to the Nepalese business community. The business communities expect this would not continue in the future and accordingly looking forward to the constructive role of CNI. To meet this expectation of the industrial community, CNI has been focusing to minimize the hindrances related to the industrial relation, access to finance and bureaucratic hassles through the

investment, the government must focus on streamlining policies and practices, and reforming domestic policies and procedures that have been serving as entry barriers to the industries and business activities. Apart from that, keeping the seriousness of such issues in mind, the government should make some efforts to ease the implementation mechanism of policy statements along with the simplified tax administration, transparent monitoring and evaluation system with the provision of award/punishment. For this, the government and the private sectors should work simultaneously with mutual trust and confidence so that the private sector, the engine of the growth, could feel their contribution in investment, employment, production as well as revenue generation when it is acknowledged by the government.

CNI, as an apex body of the country's industrial and business sectors, has been

4. Work closely with the Government and Development Partners

It should be clearly understood that the development and implementation of trade and investment-related policy, with attractive slogans and promises, will not automatically increase investment. But it will indicate a commitment of government in making the environment hospitable for investors by removing administrative barriers to investment, by increasing competitiveness and eliminating corruption. Such policy-driven improvements will go far in encouraging investors, both domestic and foreign, to locate their businesses in Nepal. In order to increase Nepal's national competitiveness and to attract more

agencies and departments not only in the issues of policy formulation but also in the process of policy implementation, monitoring and evaluation. Likewise, CNI has been closely working with the development partners, national/ international nongovernmental organizations (N/I NGOs), diplomatic missions, academia and civil society in the areas of infrastructure development, trade/investment facilitation, research and development (R&D) as well as corporate social responsibility (CSR).

5. Promoting Industrial Growth through Specialization, Innovation and Technological Advancement

Although Nepal's industrial sector recorded an annual average growth rate of around 5

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percent over the past 2 decades, the growth was uneven and set on a clear declining trend. Unless private sectors grow more rapidly than other sectors of the economy,

thereby increasing its share in overall GDP, it seems to be difficult to reduce poverty and generate well-paid jobs, and ultimately to attain the country's prosperity. In the future, a rapidly expanding Nepalese manufacturing sector, both in terms of increasing its relative size in the domestic economy and in terms of raising its productivity level is inevitable. Experiences in other South and Southeast Asian countries show that, with appropriate policies and strategies in place, the industrial sector can be turned into a driving force of

from the gradual erosion of the country's industrial competitiveness in an increasingly open trading environment.

- First, the growth rate of the Industrial sector has been quite uneven in the past years and has slowed down considerably and even posting negative growth in some years. Formal sector has become informal day by day.
- Second, with rapid globalization and trade liberalization, Nepal is facing increasingly stiff competition in its traditional export markets and products, while its domestic firms are competing against increasing inflows of imported manufactures. Foreign

economic progress.

Given the relatively small industrial base, low labor costs and potential markets, this is certainly achievable in Nepal, provided the country can restore law and order, create a stable macroeconomic and political environment and have a transparent regulatory mechanism accompanied by the conducive business environment to attract and retain specialization, innovation and technological advancement with domestic and foreign investment. CNI believes that a new industrial strategy, which emphasizes domestic linkages and the development of small and medium scale industries, has the potential to generate widespread employment in the manufacturing sector as well as in agriculture, trade, transport and supporting services, and consequently improve the living standards of large sections of the population in urban and rural areas.

Apart from that, CNI has been focusing on the industrial development strategy to face four emerging challenges - all stemming

- exchange earnings of the tourism sector have declined, putting additional pressure on the manufacturing sector to boost the next export earnings.
- Third, Nepal's traditional exports are losing share in the world market, and the world demand for its exports is stagnating or declining.
- Fourth, Nepal's industrial structure is already at odds with its long-term comparative advantage and facing renewed pressure from the impact of trade liberalization on its ailing industries.

In addition to these four main emerging challenges, the industrial sector suffers from many long-standing weaknesses, including poor investment climate and business environment, inadequate physical infrastructure, underdeveloped industrial technology and low skills and education levels. In the year 2020, the global COVI D-19 Pandemic has created big set-back and crisis in the economy, business and industry

as a whole. CNI is playing a complementary role to cope with this crisis to revive economy and business. To cope with these weaknesses, CNI has been focusing on specialization, innovation and technological advancement.

6.Acting as a Platform for Consensus Building and Networking

While policy reforms and transparency are

garments, and tariffs and bans to protect domestic firms. Moreover, the changing international environment places have pressurized all the parties to liberalize trade and investment regimes and calls for a more creative and innovative strategy while relying on close public-private partnerships to enhance the productivity and transaction efficiency of manufacturing firms, to diversify export products and markets, to create a conducive business environment, to invest in the necessary physical infrastructure, and to develop industrial technology at the

Hecessal y to address the initiediate and short-term constraints of the industrial sector, they are not sufficient by themselves to lead towards the rapid and sustained development of the economy as a whole. Because of numerous market failures faced by the domestic firms in developing their technical and managerial capabilities including information acquisition, skills upgrading and technology development; progress will not evolve naturally in the context of Nepal's present endowments and policy framework, or in the international context of stiff competition in the globalized market place. In such a situation, the role of the government as well as the private sector organizations, like CNI, should be focused on consensus building and networking, especially in the areas of promoting investment climate and business confidence where it can be most effective to attract additional investment.

The regulatory approach and policy tools used in Nepal seems to be ineffective as much as required to rely on the dispute settlement, consensus-building and networking, which has already been proved in past to spur manufacturing growth, promoting a narrow range of exports based on largely imported inputs, e.g. carpets and

firm level in order to raise the technical and managerial capabilities of domestic industrial firms. Above all, it should recognize that it is firms that compete on domestic and international markets and that public policy needs to fortify the competitive capabilities of firms.

As the industrial sector already accounts larger share for most of the country's export and its success is crucial to the country's prosperity, now and in the future. In recent years, the Nepalese industrial sector has been facing difficulties posed by international conditions, the result of the global downturn and global competition. However, Nepal has opportunities as it has one of the lowest wage rates in Asia, and can attract foreign direct investment. It boasts diverse climatic conditions, abundant water resources and hydropower potential, and a strategic location between China and India. There is much that the government and industry can do take advantage of these opportunities.

Keeping these opportunities in mind, as the apex body of the country's industrial sector, CNI has developed itself as a platform for consensus-building and networking both in national as well as international

7. Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR)

In recent decades the concept of Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) turned out to be

Keeping this reality in mind, CNI takes its CSR very seriously and, besides encouraging all its members to be active regularly to fulfill their social responsibilities, it has been an example in this sector since its inception. CNI, as an organization that is accountable to society at large and responsible to help those in need, has taken some initiatives in association with Maha Sanchar, a philanthropic organization set up by the comedian duo of Madan Krishna Shrestha and Hari Bansha Acharya, and dozens of other organizations, CNI has set up a "Citizen Relief Fund" to undertake immediate relief programs in the event of natural calamities like floods, earthquakes and fire in the country. This Fund has grown exponentially to become a dependable source for helping relief efforts in the case of natural calamities in the country as well as abroad.

8. Research and Development (R&D)

As the Industry associations of Nepal, CNI Is active in providing market and business information services to its member firms. However, due to globalization and rapid technological development, the data and information useful and relevant today may not be appropriate for tomorrow. For instance, they do not provide technical information and services such as product and process advice, productivity improvement at the plant level, advice on sources and costs of production equipment, and so on. In this era of globalization and trade liberalization, the challenge is to upgrade industry associations, not just firms, particularly their capacity to deliver technological upgrading services to their members. In this connection, Research and Development (R&D) is only the way to excel in business through specialization, innovation and technological advancement with updated and relevant data/information.

More importantly, R&D plays an important role in the innovation process which is

increasingly vital to current and future profits for companies. It results in the technology that brings new products and agencies for policy reform as well as to the member institutions to help them in specialization, innovation and technological services to the market place. I nnovation results in high-quality jobs, successful businesses, better goods and services and more efficient processes. International research has consistently demonstrated the positive correlation between R&D investment intensity and company performance measures such as sales growth and share price in the sectors where R&D is important. Businesses are in a better position to achieve and maintain a competitive advantage in the increasingly global market place with sustained R&D and other related investments at the right levels.

Furthermore, companies that carry out R&D may be in a position to claim tax relief through R&D tax credits schemes. R&D tax credits work by allowing companies to deduct qualifying expenditure on R&D activities when calculating their profit for tax purposes. Other R&D Support such as Grant for Research and Development and Knowledge Transfer Partnerships are available to help companies fulfill their R&D aspirations. Likewise, R&D results in valuable inventions, ideas and designs which can be a source of potential value when it comes to gaining competitive advantage. A variety of Intellectual Property Rights exists to help a company protect these valuable assets. Because of these reasons, CNI has been conducting various comprehensive researches in association with the different government as well as non-government organizations focusing on issues of industrial development including manufacturing and service sectors. Accordingly, CNI has been forwarding the conclusions derived from the research studies to concerned government

advancement.

Trade and Investment Facilitation

Trade and investment are the two sides of a coin. Generally, for countries like Nepal, where the five decades-long development efforts of the government are far behind in comparison to other countries that started the planned development strategy simultaneously, equal emphasis should be given to promote both the trade and investment. Studies found that the influence of market and supplier access on investment location decisions was four times greater than that of production costs. So, access to markets and access to suppliers are the most important factors affecting entry decisions by domestic as well as foreign investors and are the serious issues of trade and investment promotion.

Trade, investment, and production patterns in production chains are also partly determined by agglomeration and dispersion effects across countries and commodities. Trade facilitation has an indirect impact on Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) inflows by lowering the cost of spreading production across several countries in order to take advantage of their comparative advantages. Increased FDI, in turn, can further boost regional trade, adding to the direct effect of improvements in trade facilitation across borders. If the advantages of scattering production across economies in a region outweigh those from concentrating it together, trade facilitation makes FDI complementary to trade. This can create a virtuous cycle of trade facilitation, trade, and investment that fosters increased

trade and economic growth.

To compete for larger shares of regional supply chains, countries have striven to improve their trade services. To this end, the government should actively promote infrastructure development in order to strengthen its competitive and comparative advantage and the private sectors as well as Trade Support Institutions (TSIs) should focus on specialization, innovation and technological advancement to reduce the cost of production and in turn to maximize production, profit and investment. An FDI and export-oriented development strategy with well-developed trade and investment facilitation mechanism supported by the economy's integration in global production networks enhances the investment attractiveness to foreign firms. CNI, as a leading trade/investment support institution and sounding voice of industries, well understands its role to link the Nepali products in global supply chains through industrial development and the resulting high-quality production and trade services.

In order to facilitate trade and investment in Nepal, CNI in cooperation with the government of Nepal-Ministry of Industry (MoI) and USAI D-NEAT activity has developed an information portal 'www. investnepal.gov.np', which will be working as a window for domestic as well as foreign investors to know about Nepal's investment climate, investment procedures, visa process, policies, laws, and acts including different surveys and treaties and agreements signed by Nepal with other countries. CNI as an apex body of the country's industrial sector is the operator as well as manager of the portal will be updating the information when they emerged continuously. Likewise, CNI in

cooperation with the European Union is going to commence a special project called 'Go International' to promote export of Nepali products, identified by NTIS, to the European markets.

Apart from that CNI has identified the following major areas for trade and investment facilitation and accordingly working on the same. These areas are trade and investment promotion; customs clearance facilitation; commodity inspection and quarantine, food safety, quality and standardization; electronic business; transparency in laws and regulations; cooperation of small and medium enterprises, commercialization of agriculture, promotion of high-value crops and cooperation with trade partners as well as concerned government organizations.

10. Certificate of Origin (CoO)

The Certificate of Origin (COO) is a document issued by the government or private sector business organization to certify the place of growth, production or manufacture of goods. It is required when exporting to specific countries, when requested by the consignee for customs clearance, or when it's stipulated in a letter of credit. The CO identifies goods and contains an express certification by a government authority, or other empowered body, that the goods in question originate in a specific country.

Many importers insist upon a CO when dealing with foreign exporters. Although obtaining a CO is straightforward, it's important that specific procedures are as follows:

 Updated information of exporters in a specified form, which has to be

completed and forwarded to the appropriate Chamber of the State/ Territory, together with a list of signatories authorized to sign the certificates

- Evidence of origin i.e. copies of the invoice, a bill of lading, a letter of credit, or a statutory declaration, must be supplied prior to stamping
- Exporters must provide a copy of the documents being stamped for Chamber records.
- Before submission for authentication, the exporter must sign all export documents on the bottom left-hand side under the exporter's declaration

CNI has also been engaged in issuing
Certificate of Origin to the member as well as
non-member enterprises engaged in exports
of various products to international markets.
Within couple of months CNI is planning
to issue online Certificate. CNI has been
represented in the Technical Committee of
the Department of Industries to look after
the technical aspects of export formalities
and accordingly providing services to the
exporters.

11. Membership Services

CNI Membership Committee as well as the Secretariat has been actively rendering services to its members. Fast and efficient means of e-mail communication has been brought into active use. This system provides members with speedy, economical and prompt service. Because of this reason, the visits of CNI delegation to different countries have been able to further strengthen and expand its relationship with associated

chamber organizations in these countries.

Active involvement of CNI members in such visits to chamber organizations of neighboring countries has provided an opportunity to explore the potential trade opportunities in these markets and attracting potentials from those countries.

12. Information Collection, Documentation and Publication

CNI is well equipped with important information related to trade, commerce and industry both at national as well as international levesl. The CNI secretariat has been regularly collecting and updating the data related to major economic indicators as well as trade and investment statistics, and accordingly publishing trade directories, publications, journals and articles. Foreign Trade/Information Division of CNI has been actively coordinating with world trade organization (WTO), International Trade Center (LTC), SAFTA and BIMSTIC to acquire information needs of its members and other users and addressing their query on commercial, industrial and export promotion matters. Apart from that, CNI has been regularly publishing its monthly newsletter 'MONITOR' which carries information on its activities and issues related to the economy. Also, CNI is regularly publishing various articles and magazines with regards to the investment, business, trade, policies, socioeconomic and others that are distributed across the nation through its solid channel.

CNI's Budget Discussion with the Finance Minister for Fiscal Year 2077/78

"Employment generation, development of the private sector including Agriculture, Small and Medium Enterprises should be prioritized"

The Confederation of Nepalese Industries (CNI) has submitted its suggestions and discussed with Finance Minister Dr. Yuba Raj Khatiwada to be included in the annual

budget of the coming Fiscal Year 2077/78. CNI has submitted a report to Finance Minister Khatiwada along with the objectives of the budget towards job creation, development of the private sector, small and medium enterprises including agriculture. A delegation led by Confederation's President Satish Kumar More presented policy and thematic suggestions of the budget at the Ministry of Finance.

CNI has requested for a budget that included expansionary fiscal policy and an increase in

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industries in the current fiscal year. The
Confederation has also requested to set up a
separate refinancing fund of hundred billion
rupees. CNI suggests that industrial promotion
policies should be stable for at least five years
down the line. It has been requested to provide
a cash subsidy based on the value addition in



the timely spending of the capital budget.

It has been requested to provide income tax exemption for 10 years to attract investment in agriculture sector for job creation and to set up a guarantee fund to raise investment for the development of small and medium enterprises. CNI has asked to reduce the cost of investment by at least 5 percent for the next three years to ensure the increased investment in the country. In order to increase liquidity in the crisis situation created by COVI D-19, the budget should focus to release the payment due by the government. CNI has suggested to increase the personal income tax slab so that to increase the disposable income and overall market demand. This will ultimately increase the revenue of the government with the increased consumer spending.

It has been requested to provide refinancing at a maximum of 5 percent to the loss-making

every export through the budget. Similarly, it has been requested to make arrangements for the export house to facilitate the micro entrepreneurs of the country. CNI has also requested to make arrangements to allow Nepalese industries to invest abroad to expand their market at the international level making them more competitive.

The issues raised by CNI are relevant at a time when the country is in a very critical situation in terms of economic activities the Finance Minister mentioned. He has assured the government will not reduce the amount of the budget. The government is working to create an environment to increase the export of Nepalese products. The government is with the Nepalese industrialists to increase their confidence and to create investment-friendly climate, he mentioned.

During the discussion, CNI President- Satish Kumar More, Senior Vice President- Vishnu Kumar Agrawal, Vice Presidents- Anuj Agarwal, Nirvana Chaudhary, Rajesh Agrawal and other officials were present.

CNI's Response to the Fiscal Year 2077/78 Budget

inance Minister Dr. Yuba Raj Khatiwada has presented a budget of Rs. 14 Kharab 74 Arab 64 Crore in the Combined House of the Parliament. As per the understanding of CNI, in the current dire economic situation, the budget seems to be pragmatic and balanced in terms of size and program. It has been found

that the budget has addressed the suggestions made by CNI beforehand. However, CNI has found that the budget is silent on some of the suggested aspects.

It is positive that this budget has addressed the development of infrastructure and human resource especially in the health sectors. However, it does not address the participation of the private sector in this sector. In order to revive the various industries directly affected by the COVID- 19 pandemic, the budget has provided a refinancing fund worth Rs. One hundred billion and a relief fund with Rs 50 billion has been provided to the most affected tourism sector. CNI expects other demands raised by the private sector to be addressed through monetary policy. This budget has tried to address the issue of electricity tariff being raised by the private sector. CNI exclaims that the provision of waiving the demand charge of the industries and giving a 50 percent discount on the existing tariff during the off-peak hour is positive.

This budget has also given special attention to insurance and agriculture. We believe that the provision of Kisan Credit Card, Bhumi other facilities provided for small and medium enterprises are important. The proposal to cut various government expenditures is commendable. We feel that the government must increase the professionalism of the civil servants. As the list of excise duty items and their rates are increasing, the list of such items should not be increased and CNI demands that excise duty should be levied only on items that adversely affect health and environment.

The Government has addressed the concept of export house for the first time through this budget. The proposal to build a satellite city in collaboration with the private sector is appreciable. As the budget's expectation to address the current issue of workers' wages has not been fulfilled, CNI feels that the government needs to ensure that such things do not worsen the labor relations. Rather than encouraging the government to reduce the import of petroleum products and increase the consumption of electricity, the announcement of raising taxes on electric vehicles seems inappropriate. This would create problems in the environment-friendly energy use.

Additionally, we feel that this budget has failed to address the sick and loss-making industries. Although the projection of economic growth seems ambitious, the forthcoming monetary policy is likely to help in achieving the target, if the environment is conducive to the private sector.

CNI's Suggestions and Discussions on the Monetary Policy of F.Y. 2077/78

The Confederation of Nepalese Industries (CNI) has presented the suggestions for the monetary policy for the coming Fiscal Year 2077/78 BS to the Governor of Nepal Rastra Bank, Mr. Maha Prasad Adhikari and other high-ranking officials of the central bank. CNI's suggestion on the monetary policy was developed on the basis of suggestion from its members.

In the suggestion, it has been mentioned that the monetary policy should take a policy of reducing interest rates to promote investment. CNI has stated that the steps taken by the NRB in this regard are appreciable but it is not enough and further policy reforms are needed. Similarly, in the current dire situation, it has been requested for interest capitalization, restructuring the existing loan and easing the process for additional loan.

CNI has also requested NRB to speed up the process of refinancing which was recently declared by the Government. The limit of

concessional loans should be increased to 20% of the total loan of industry and business. Similarly, CNI has said that none of industry and business should be deprived to file loan from this fund. CNI has urged to make special arrangements for the refinancing MSMEs.

During the discussion, Governor Maha
Prasad Adhikari said that CNI's suggestions
were relevant and positive. Stating that the
country's economy is in dire condition and it
is very challenging to revive the economy in
such a situation, he said that as NRB has a
major role in this; Rastra Bank is thinking of
adopting new policy to facilitate the industries
and businesses in achieving the target set by
the government. "We have tried to clarify our
vision and goals through policy and operational
changes that have taken place in recent days,"
he added.

Nepal Electricity Authority Releases Electricity Tariff

n the past, the country has suffered a severe shortage of electricity supply.

Even the industrial world of Nepal was not untouched by such scarcity. Because of the supply of electricity for some time or low voltage even during the supply, the operation of tools and machinery becomes very difficult.

As the industries have been experiencing extreme electricity shortages in the past for a long time, some industries had applied for a continuous supply of electricity from the dedicated feeder and trunk lines as per the required quantity, in accordance with the provisions of the NVPA Regulations.

As the Government of Nepal has been encouraging the private sector to operate industries in various sectors, we would like to commend the Government of Nepal for this. Various laws of Nepal have provided for the minimum infrastructure necessary to operate the industry, such as electricity, water and road industries. For those industries which have been established to employ large scale of people whilst paying millions of taxes annually to the government, the Nepal Government has legally provided facility regarding the rate of payment for electricity consumption. Despite this fact, NEA is charging such industrialists with chaotic rates indicating them as dedicated feeder customers instead of entering into an agreement with them for a fixed rate. This has reduced the morale of the industrialists by charging them with such rates. CNI demands that such industrialists should not be compelled to pay for the unused service and service charges in the present context.

Based on a request for a minimum supply of

20 hours or more from the dedicated feeder, it is decided by the Board of Directors of the Authority to bill the consumers and industries, (other than the consumers who have supplied and consumed electricity for 20 hours or more), with demand charge by stating that the electricity has been supplied through the dedicated feeder is inappropriate, and CNI strongly protests such act.

Even the contracting industries are charged with the demand charges before the time of the agreement, which we believe is inappropriate. CNI assures to assist in getting the tariffs paid as per the agreement from the industries that are reluctant to pay the agreed-upon tariffs. But as a matter of concern, it is not appropriate to compel the industries to pay the tariffs for the electricity they have neither demanded nor used that even when these industries are paying electricity tariffs every month according to the prevailing laws.

In the present context of the normal supply of electricity in the country, except for the dedicated feeders and those who need and the demand for unmatched quality power supply, CNI demands that the general industry be charged according to the tariff. We also strongly urge the bill correction of those industries which has not undergone any such agreements in the past as well. After the declaration of load-free Nepal, CNI would like to draw serious attention to the authority towards the non-existence of dedicated feeder and electricity supply through the dedicated feeder.

Joint Release of the Confederation of Nepalese Industries (CNI) and the Federation of Nepalese Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FNCCI) on the Amendment of Commission for Investigation of Abuse of Authority Act, 2076

he Confederation of Nepalese
Industries (CNI) and the Federation
of Nepalese Chambers of Commerce
and Industry (FNCCI) have drawn a serious
attention to the third amendment of the
Commission for Investigation of Abuse of
Authority (CIAA) Act, 2076. At a time when the
world is in a state of panic and the economy
has almost come to a standstill, such a
controlling provision in the bill has further
troubled Nepal's private sector.

Many other regulatory bodies have been formed under different prevailing laws for the regulation of industries/establishments/ companies run by the private sector and such regulatory bodies are under the supervision of the authorities themselves. Despite such an arrangement, the provision of the proposed bill through the Authority (constitutional body) to re-regulate the private sector has discouraged

the private sector. This has led the private sectors to conclude that the entire investment environment will become unfavorable in the country. The proposed provision would interfere with the professional freedom of private companies. I nstead of focusing on running the country's economy and business, this would lead to harassment of the private sectors through government agencies. The proliferation of investigative agencies would discourage professionals and eventually they will flee. This can seriously affect the country's economic activities.

Such a provision would negatively affect the economic stability through job creation while expanding and developing the industries. Therefore, CNI and FNCCI strongly urge to amend the proposed provision as soon as possible.

Bangladesh willing to Import Yarn from Nepal

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Request to Energy Minister Barshaman Pun for Relief in Electricity Tariff during COVID-19 Crisis



Officials of the major Nepalese private sector organizations, the Confederation of Nepalese I ndustries, the Federation of Nepalese Chambers of Commerce and I ndustry and Nepal Chamber of Commerce, have urged Energy Minister Barshaman Pun for relief in electricity tariffs to reduce the cost of production to avert the growing crisis by COVI D-19. A report prepared by the three major private sector organizations on the Corona virus pandemic and lockdown was also handed over to the Energy Minister. The report called for relief in electricity tariffs to reduce cost of production as electricity tariffs remain a significant part of the cost for industries.

Electricity Authority to be flexible about the relief that can be given in the electricity tariff as there is no certainty in the length of lockdown period.

Earlier, all three private sector organizations had submitted a joint suggestion report to the Chief Secretary, Central Bank and other government bodies requesting to announce an immediate economic recovery package. The report includes suggestions relating to monetary, labor and employment, electricity and policy reforms to address the acute economic crisis.

It is requested that the demand charge waiver should be provided and the deadline for payment of electricity tariff should be postponed for the lockdown period. 20 percent reduction on electricity tariff should be made for coming 15 months. Minister Pun informed that the Electricity Board has already authorized the Executive Director of the Nepal



The attention of the Chief Secretary has been drawn towards the results of the study conducted in collaboration with international organizations. A joint study report has also been handed over to the Chief Secretary.

The private sectors have suggested the government to move forward with two basic things. It has been asked to help the poor, those working in the informal sector and the self-employed through fiscal policy. About 5 percent of Nepal's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) needs to be transferred directly or indirectly in such sectors. Studies have shown that this can prevent the economy from going into recession while avoiding the decrease in overall demand. Similarly, it has been asked to support Nepal's industrial and commercial sectors through monetary policy.

For this, the government is asked not to allow liquidity shortage by making some changes in the existing monetary policy without direct investment. It is suggested to reduce the interest rate on the loan by 5 percent and maintain the policy for the next three years to prevent the shutting down of industries and business enterprises.

The Chief Secretary was informed about the fact that the employers could not pay the salaries and wages as the transactions are closed during the lockdown. The industrialists shared their views that the industry could pay maximum 50 percent of the wages for the period of lockdown and the remaining 50 percent should be paid by the government through various measures.

The Chief Secretary said that the government is taking a serious consideration at this as it is aware that the private sector contributes 70 percent of Nepal's economy directly. "The Government of Nepal understands the private sector and is formulating policies accordingly. We will not let industries and businesses to collapse because of the crisis," he said. He

also added that even if Nepal's economic growth rate could not be maintained as in the past, it would not be allowed to fall below that of other countries either. For this, "The government is willing to work with the private sector." The government has been positive towards allowing the necessary industries to

run. He also informed that a decision on this issue will be taken soon.

The discussion was attended by the CNI President, FNCCI President and NCC President as well as Senior Vice Presidents of all the three organizations and other officials.

Private Sector Meets Former Prime Minister Deuba and Leader of the Opposition Party in the Parliament to Discuss on Resolving the Crisis in Nepal's Economy caused by COVID-19 Pandemic

Congress President and Former Prime
Minister Sher Bahadur Deuba regarding
the government's policies, programs and
budget for the upcoming fiscal year. Congress
President Deuba said that he would create
pressure on the government as an opposition
party to resolve the economic crisis caused
by the pandemic. He also said that the Nepali
Congress was positive towards the concept
presented by the private sector to solve the
problem and ask the government to address

it through the budget. On the occasion, Nepali Congress leader and former Finance Minister Gyanendra Bahadur Karki said that the private sector should focus on import substitution to build a self-reliant economy.

During the interaction, CNI President, Satish Kumar More said that it was necessary to bring an economic recovery package to reduce the crisis in the economy due to the Corona Virus pandemic and the lockdown. He also mentioned that joint efforts of the



government, private sector, political parties and other stakeholders are needed to prevent the economic loss and to manage the employment. FNCC1 President, Bhavani Rana and NCC President, Rajesh Kaji Shrestha said that they have expected further relief through the monetary measures to be taken by Nepal Rastra Bank. FNCC1 Senior Vice-President, Shekhar Golchha said the budget should address measures to reduce the rising cost of investment considering the Corona crisis. HAN President, Srijana Rana said that the current crisis has severely affected the tourism and hospitality sector and hence requested more flexible policy from the government to provide adequate relief in bank loans and labor management.

Giving a presentation on the joint suggestions submitted by the private sectors, CNI Vice President, Anuj Agarwal had requested to bring an economic recovery package. Vice

President Agarwal said that measures related to the financial, monetary and industrial sectors have been presented so as not to impose an additional burden on the government while facing the dire economic crisis. He also said that suggestions have been made to move towards expansionary fiscal policy and stimulus package, employment and investment-oriented policies. Keeping these suggestions in mind, Nepali Congress is expected to play an active role in the parliament as main opposition party. CNI Senior Vice President Vishnu Agrawal said that as industry, trade and business may collapse due to prolonged lockdown due to COVID-19. It is necessary to start working on ways to run the economy by relaxing the current lockdown with the necessary precautions. On the occasion, other representatives of private-sector organizations also expressed their views on the impact of the Corona Virus on the economy and industry.

CNI Presents COVID-19 Economic Survival: Webinar Series

18-21 May 2020

The Confederation of Nepalese Industries (CNI), in partnership with Frost & Sullivan, designed a four-part webinar series to discuss the impact caused by COVID-19, as well as strategies to kickstart economic recovery. The themes covered were Rescue: Banking and Finance, Reinforce: Energy and Agriculture, Restart: Industry and Labor, and Respond: Economy. The panelists comprised of industry experts, policy makers, government representatives, and thought leaders.

The first webinar, Rescue: Banking and

Finance, hosted discussions about the impact on the financial sector, as well as strategies for survival and recovery. All major sectors that contribute to Nepal's GDP have been significantly affected. Of those, the tourism and manufacturing industries have been most affected, while the agricultural industry has been least affected. The first step towards economic recovery is to recreate market demand. An effective way to achieve demand is to expand the LCT sector. Additionally, liquidity needs to be injected into the economy to make capital markets accessible to investors.

The third webinar, Restart: Industry and Labor, explored opinions regarding the impact of the pandemic and lockdown on industry as well as the resulting unemployment crisis. 60% of all workers in Nepal have lost their jobs due to the pandemic. The government needs to design and distribute a stimulus package, as the largest issue hindering industry is the lack of purchasing power. Additionally, cash relief will be essential for the millions of workers who are displaced. As the labor sector cannot exist without the private sector, plans need to be designed and implemented to reopen the economy gradually sector-by-sector.

The fourth webinar, Respond: Economy, focused on the overall economic impact of the pandemic, as well as strategies to restart the

The second webinar, Reinforce: Energy and Agriculture, focused on impacts and recovery plans for the energy and agriculture sectors. For the agriculture sector to yield higher productivity, systematic planning and restructuring of the sector is needed by incorporating climate, soil, and market conditions, as well as by introducing mechanization. The sector should be lucrative enough to attract a portion of migrant returnees. The energy sector should be offered subsidies to help counter-balance the current losses being felt. Long term incentives should be provided to investors of hydropower

economy and accelerate economic growth. Based on effective stimulus packages of other nations, the government of Nepal should create a stimulus package of about five percent of GDP (~\$1.5 billion). Building adequate infrastructure to handle the pandemic, using modern technology to promote e-commerce, and focusing on the survival of MSMEs should be the immediate plans for survival and recovery. The large number of returnee migrants should be mobilized through provision of adequate training and funding to recover GDP contribution lost from remittance. Manpower with quality health and education is the key to Nepal's economic growth, so long-term investments need to be made in those

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Purnima: UK Support to Post-Earthquake Recovery in Nepal

Confederation of Nepalese Industries has been working as a partner in the Purnima Project to carry out the different activities of the project with the objective is long-term positive change in the lives of people in earthquake-affected regions of Nepal.

Purnima is a five-year program (2017-2022) funded by the UK Department for International Development (DFID) and managed by Mott MacDonald. The program will work mainly in four of the worst-affected districts: Gorkha, Dhading, Nuwakot, and Rasuwa. The aim is not only to reconstruct the earthquake-damaged structures but to build back better and improve infrastructure. As a partner, CNI is working on capacity building of Private Sectors, especially for women, through the Purnima Project. By continuing until 2022, seven years after the earthquakes, the program will provide the long-term support for recovery which has been shown from international experience to be so important.

towards the energy efficiency development and awareness raising activities.

Vice-President of CNI, Rajesh Agarwal highlighted the importance of energy efficiency. Such programs are believed not only to reduce the cost of production but also to reduce the import of various energy products by reducing energy consumption. In the program, German Ambassador, DCM Dr. Claudia Hiepe, said the Federal Government of Germany could help Nepal not only in energy efficiency but also in various other sectors, and expressed commitment to have intensive discussions with CNI regarding the same.

The main objective of Nepal Energy Efficiency Program implemented by the Ministry of Assistance and Development (VI MZ) is to identify energy efficiency as a source of energy in Nepal. The current scope of this program, which has been in operation since 2005, covers the policy making for energy efficiency and energy conservation in Nepal, capacity building of Nepal Electricity Authority in the distribution of electricity demand and supply, enhancement of energy efficiency services, commodities market expansion and inclusion of subject related to energy efficiency in higher education and technical education.

According to Gyanendra Upadhyay, Nepalbased consultant of the KFW, there is a separate fund (s) for economic development and energy efficiency development under Energy, Water Resources and Irrigation, with the technical assistance of the German Development Assistance-GLZ for the German Federal Government Ministry of Economic the Ministry of Economic Development and Development of the German Federal Government.

CNI Intervention to Develop Integrated Web Portal (www.nepalrecovery.org) to Collect and Deliver Information on COVID-19

CNI launched Crisis Response and Business Recovery web page-ingrate with CNI official web page. It is an integrated platform which studies the impact of COVID-19 PANDEMIC on economic and industrial trade and advise reliable and up-to-date policy, official information and measures for its regeneration around the world. Its primary purpose is to provide reliable information based on the needs of business and financial sector stakeholders.

The web portal is the source of integrated

information for the crisis-hit industry and service business sector. It mainly focuses on two areas:

- First, build an integrated platform to support, relief provided to industries and other stakeholders.
- Second, Customize I LO surveying the impact on industry and service trade. The results of the survey may facilitate in receiving support from the government and other donors for the fast recovery industry.

NEPAL INFRASTRUCTURE SUMMIT-2019 AT A GLANCE



he Confederation of Nepalese Industries (CNI), organized the third Nepal Infrastructure Summit-2019, on 23rd and 24th Bhadra (11-12 September, 2019) at Hyatt Regency. The summit was jointly organized by CNI, Ministry of Physical Infrastructure and Transport (MoPIT- Nepal Government), Investment Board Nepal and YCNC with the theme of "Strong Infrastructure for Sustainable Development", was taken as a follow up of the Investment Summit organized by the Government last year. The summit was inagurated by Rt. Honorable Vice- President of Nepal, Mr. Nanda Bahadur Pun. The summit acted as a catalyst for further attention of all stakeholders, including the government, to raise the pace of legal reform made during the investment summit, and to raise investment for the proposed project presented at the investment summit.

The previous two precedent summit had pointed out that a comprehensive and indepth study should be undertaken to figure out Nepal's infrastructure status up to 2030 and additional investment needed for the upcoming infrastructures. Focusing on this, the Confederation in coordination with the Center for Holistic Development Studies had completed such report. This report was made public at the Third Infrastructure Summit.

The multiplayer effect of high investment in infrastructure, i.e. multidimensional impact, highly contributes to economic growth.

The Government of Nepal is also providing opportunities for the private sector to increase investment in infrastructure development and to develop large projects in public-private partnerships, by setting the national aspirations of Prosperous Nepal Happy Nepalese and focusing on infrastructure

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

Hydropower for the Economy Upliftment of Nepal

I would like to show my appreciation towards CNI for activating the Energy Development Council (EDC) and giving me this opportunity to chair. Annual Total Energy cost is the biggest amount we spend every year. Energy cost exceeds the annual budget of the country. Energy cost is more than the annual food or logistics costs that Nepal spends on. Main sources of energy are wood, petroleum products, coal, electricity and cow manure which we need for agro productivity.

Energy can be categorized in two categories: one being traditional energy and the second being commercial energy. Commercial energy contributes to increase the GDP of the nation whereas traditional energy is used mainly for cooking purposes and does not contribute to the GDP growth of the nation. In traditional way the maximum energy is taken from wood and cow manure. Likewise commercial energy is taken from electricity, petroleum products and coal. NepaleseForests are not sufficient to supply our needs. Around 18 lakhs metric ton of wood every year is being used whereas forests'sustainable supply is 12 lakhs metric ton. This in turn has created huge pressure for deforestation if we do not reduce the consumption from these forests and saving greenery will be difficult. The cow manure which should be used for agriculture as organic fertilizers isbeing used as cooking fuels in the Terairegion. This is also one of the reasons for our low agriculture output. We have to maximize the use of gobargas plants so that the gas can be taken out for cooking purposeswhile the cow manurecan be used as fertilizers in agriculture.

In terms of commercial energy, electricity holds less than 4% of total energy supplied. In terms of electricity when we convert all our energy from other sources to electrical terms, we in reality consume more than 1,54,000Gwh annuallyin comparison to 6400 Gwhof electricity that we consumed last year. Presently, total energy cost in terms of electricity can be Nrs. 2140 billion which is much higher than any other thing we spend for in this county.

Currently, import of petroleum products, gas and coal is increasing in such a way that our Balance of Payment (BOP) with I ndia has ahugedeficit. I mport of commercial energy has climbed to the number one position in our import list. Moreover, our hard earned foreign currency is going to I ndia to buy the energy which we cansimplyproduced through Hydropower. Hence maximizing the use of Hydropower, electricity for the domestic consumption to in turn increase industrial production, replace cooking gas, increase the energy per capita of Nepalese, contribute to the GDP and export excess energy to I ndia and Bangladesh will make our Balance of payment stronger and assist in bringing in a lot of foreign currency.

We have been consuming more than 80% of our energy for cooking whereas only 20% of the commercial energy including electricity is used for the contribution towards the growth in the GDP's of the country. So unless and until the energy security is not confirmed, the country's development, industrialization, GDP growth and rural employment creation is not possible.

Nepal government has taken up the target of Hydropower development in the country by reaching 3000 Mw in the next 2 years, 5000 Mw in 5 years and 15,000 Mw in 10 years. Nevertheless NEA took 110 years for 600 MW of electricity production whereas private sector has managed to do more than that in 12 active years. **This result is a clear indication showing that Government can reach its target timely only by joining hands with the private sector.**

Each 500 MW of new Hydropower adds up to 1% to our GDP. Similarly, every Kwh of electricity consumed contributes \$1 equivalent in our GDP. Each 1000 MW export will bring back USD 400 million (NRs. 50 billion) foreign currency every year to our economy. In the past, energy being such an important sector was not managed properly, therefore all the major problems today revolve around energy. Fuel import is one of the biggest costs for us currently. Most funds from the BOP go for this. Our exports have not been able to grow as compared to our imports. Electricity can be the biggest foreign currency earner in the next 10 years. Moreover, the excess electricity if we manage to export to Bangladesh and I ndia will help out with our BOP and fuel imports.

Hydropower construction is a difficult task, increase in consumption is also not an easy task as well. Presently Nepal is exporting about 85 Mw during spill night time to India. In the coming 4 years, 900 Mw Arun III will be exporting 80% of the energy. Similarly, the 2500 Mw construction of private sector would also have completed which would assist in internal consumption and export.

At present, industries are not getting the demanded electricity and it is of utmost importance to provide it to them. Similarly, if electricity is priced appropriately then iron sponge, iron billet factories can aid in consuming maximum electricity. Another area which can consume high electricity is the replacement of cooking gas. In addition, it takes less than 2 years to replace about Nrs. 40 billion cooking gas export through PROR hydropower projects. However for this to be possible, additional tax on gas imports and policies encouraging electricity consumption needs to be implemented.

construction of more and more Hydropower and maximizing consumption together with excess export can only help our economy to grow faster.




